East and West Suffolk added to Covid-19 watchlist

A Suffolk County Council press release on 08 October warned us that East and West Suffolk had been placed on an East of England watchlist by Public Health England, due to a continuing rise in Covid-19 cases.

The rise in cases was not specifically linked to a certain group of people, or type of workplace but widespread across the community.

The situation is constantly changing so by the time you read this, at the beginning of November, the picture may have changed again. However, the key message will have remained the same:

"Hands, face, space":

- Maintain health & hygiene standards through regular handwashing
- Wear a mask
- Maintain 2m distance from people, wherever possible

These measures will help stop the virus from spreading and will help keep our number of cases to some of the lowest in the country.

Remember - if you experience any of the recognised Covid-19 symptoms, you must immediately book a test and begin selfisolating. If you cannot book a test straight away, be patient and keep trying. You have up to eight days to take your test from when you first experience symptoms.

Symptoms are:

- · a high temperature
- · a new, continuous cough
- · a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste.

Throughout these difficult times we have continued to maintain our services, such as land maintenance, play area inspections and responding to local and national consultations.

Working Groups

Our working groups have continued to make progress on their varied projects:

- Recreation Ground & Kronji's Piece Steering Group - developing a management plan for the Recreation Ground - look out for consultation at a
- Community Orchard Working Group the volunteers have done a fantastic job in keeping the trees watered throughout the summer with no supply on hand; many thanks to them. We are hoping to secure a permanent water supply on the Orchard The group is now considering its autumn/winter maintenance and Phase 2 of the planting scheme for next year.
- continues to keep the woods safe for us all to enjoy.
- Climate Emergency Working Group held its inaugural meeting in September & will be informing many aspects of our work. Please look out for more news direct from

the group in this or December's edition.

- Sports Fund Working Group following the successful installation of the trim trail, the group has moved on to its next project, which, through consultation, you identified as a multi-games area (MUGA). We are restricted by the availability of suitable land. We are looking into what we can do on our land known as the Jubilee Playspace, as well as an upgrade of the existing children's play area. Consultation will take place in due course.
- Wildflower Project Team working with the principal authorities to improve the wildflower value of some of the roadside verges in the parish.

Due to this and the lack of proper notification, we were granted an extension for comments until 15 October.

New Chairman Elected.

East Suffolk Council elected its new chairman at a Virtual Annual Meeting that was held on 23rd September 2020

Cllr Keith Richardson, who represents the Oulton Broad Ward, will be Chairman for the remainder of the 2020/21 Municipal Year, taking on the post from Cllr Colin Hedgley.

New Ambitious Local Plan Approved. East Suffolk Council have adopted the Suffolk Coastal Local Plan. An ambitious strategy to guide and manage new development for the former Suffolk Coastal area in a sustainable and plan led way. It proposes the delivery of at least 6,500 jobs and 9,756 new homes over the period to 2036 supported by the delivery of appropriate infrastructure whilst also setting out an approach to protect, maintain and enhance the high quality built, historic and natural environment, and mitigate and adapt to climate change.

New Service for Council Tenants to be Launched. East Suffolk Council's housing tenants will soon be able to manage their tenancy more easily using a new online service, due to be launched later this year. The new portal, called 'myHome East Suffolk' will be launched by the end of the year and will enable those living in council owned properties to manage payments,

request repairs and make appointments quickly and easily. More details about how to sign up for the new service will be released in the coming weeks and all tenants will be contacted directly regarding the new service.

Major Funding Boost to help Tackle
Homelessness. East Suffolk Council has
been awarded £93,312 in funding as pat
of the Government's 'Next Steps
Accommodation Programme', to help
vulnerable people housed during the
pandemic stay in accommodation. Working
closely with key partners across the
district, the funding will enable the Council
to continue to provide accommodation and
support for vulnerable people placed under

Covid 19 provisions, including assisting with offers of accommodation in the private rented sector; offering employment and skills support through a personalised one-to-one coaching service delivered by: Access Community Trust; and providing additional emergency beds during the colder Winter months.

People Encouraged to stay Safe on our Coast.

A campaign was launched earlier this year to remind residents and visitors about the importance of staying safe on our coast.

Throughout the Covid 19 restrictions and particularly since early Summer, the Council's Coastal Management Team has received almost daily reports from concerned land owners, businesses and



the community about people climbing on eroding cliffs, climbing on top of sea defences and ignoring signs warning of potential dangers.

The campaign encourages people to visit the coast and enjoy all that there is to see and do but also aims to educate people to take care whilst they are there to ensure that their visit is enjoyable and safe. The campaign launched on social media and with posters and information in prominent local places.

Anyone who notices anything unusual or dangerous about cliffs or any coastal defences, should email coastalmanagement@eastsuffolk.gov.uk In an emergency always call 999 and ask for the Coastguard.



Wildflowers have been introduced onto a section of our land between the two benches on Eagle Way near The Grove. The gorse has been cut away at this point and seeding has been completed.

MARTLESHAM HEATH - A HISTORY

Detailed planning permission for the first Martlesham hamlet of ninety dwellings was granted in 1975 and by September that year the first show houses were completed.

Martlesham's first family moved to its new home on 27th May 1976, nearly fifteen years after the plans were first conceived.

The company's initial capital investment in the project by that stage topped £2 million and all the road and other infrastructure works that were necessary before the first houses could be marketed, as well as the costs of the house building programme itself, came from BPT's own cash resources. Bidwells have managed both the housing project and the industrial estate from the beginning but the company decided that nobody could handle the sales better than its own staff and Harry Higgins, the senior branch manager, moved from Walthamstow to become the village's sales manager. As a variant of BPT's estate management techniques his responsibilities have, as the project is still in the building stage, necessarily involved a considerable amount of after sales service.

Clifford Culpin and Partners, the architects for the scheme as a whole and for the first phase of housing, worked to a BPT brief that incorporated the random mixture of house styles, sizes and materials that would be found in an established Suffolk village. In that first phase of houses and flats, which were

built around a seven-and-a-half-acre village green, the dwellings ranged in price from £9,000 one-bedroom flats to £29,000 five-bedroom, two bathroom houses with double garages. That range of houses and flat sizes will be seen throughout the whole of the Martlesham Heath project, and BPT has ensured a variety of house styles by retaining from the outset three different architectural firms to work on the twelve hamlets that will form the whole 1,000 home village, and subsequently at least one other architect has become involved.

It has been the company's intention to create the framework of a community rather than a housing estate for both social and commercial reasons. If, unlike so many modern estates, Martlesham continues to be a place where people wish to live, the value of the properties will be enhanced as the development progresses. That will benefit both the earlier house buyers and the company. In the meantime the industrial estate developed alongside the village has become BPT's most import and most profitable, commercial property holding. Letting income from the estate already accounts for more than ten per cent of the company's total rental income, and these industrial buildings now produce more each year than Martlesham Heath as a whole cost back in 1942.

KESGRAVE LIBRARY NEWS

It has been lovely to welcome so many of you back to the library over the last couple of months. We have really missed you.

We are extending our opening hours to include Monday mornings again, from Monday 2nd November. Please see our revised opening hours at the end of this article.

The following guidelines are still in place: -

- Only 3 customers are allowed in the library at any one time. Queuing may be experienced at times of heavy demand.
- All returned items are to be placed through our letterbox, to enable us to quarantine them for 72 hours.
- Browsing is limited to approximately 15 minutes.
- There is a one-way system in place.
- Customers are required to anti-bac their hands before they begin browsing.

- It is mandatory for customers to wear a facemask that covers both their nose and mouth, unless they have an exemption.
- It is now mandatory for customers to complete a
 Track & Trace form or scan the QR code with
 their phones during their visits to us. Any completed forms are kept securely and destroyed
 after 21 days, if no-one contacts us to say they
 have tested positive for COVID-19.

Select & Collect – during the last two months, the library has been running a Select & Collect service. This allows customers to phone up and ask staff to put together a selection of up to 10 books for them to collect at an arranged time. This is open to any age group and has proved very popular. We are continuing this service for customers who wish to use the library but are not ready to come in and browse.

Printing, scanning and photocopying – these services are now all available. We ask customers to use contactless payment where possible. If this is not possible, please bring the correct money.





Martlesham Parish Council Climate Emergency Declaration – what next?

Along with many other Parish Councils, Martlesham has declared a 'climate emergency'. What does this mean and what can/should we be doing about it? Here are some first thoughts and steps on creating a community response to the climate emergency.

Climate Change

This refers to the overwhelming body of scientific evidence gathered over several decades that the world's climate is changing due to increasing average global temperatures caused by increased levels of carbon dioxide (and other green house gases) in the atmosphere predominately as a direct result of burning fossil fuels (oil, gas and coal). Oil, gas and coal have been locked away in the Earth for millennia, but since the industrial revolution, humans have been extracting them and using them to power our modern economies. Indeed, fossil fuels have delivered substantial improvements in food, health and general wealth for much of an increasing world population. However, it is increasingly obvious that this has come at a terrible cost to the Earth's environment (animals, plants, soil, pollution, water, air etc). Even worse, the Earth's climate is changing as a direct consequence of humans burning fossil fuels threatening our very civilization we have built on the back of those fossil fuels. Climate change is impacting lives across the globe now. For the sake of our

children, our grandchildren and ourselves now is the time for action.

What can I do?

It all seems insurmountable, but the biggest threat to humanity is that we ignore the threat and individually do nothing hoping someone else will fix it. To quote Sir David Attenborough "what happens next is up to all of us". It will be a hard slog to change our comfortable fossil fuel based ways of life but a combination of Governments' policies nudging us into the right behaviours and grassroots initiatives can give us hope.

So what can we do as individuals and as a parish?

- 1)We have set up 'Martlesham Climate Action', a Martlesham Parish Council 'Climate Emergency Working Group' to act as a catalyst to help promote, support and extend existing initiatives and drive new ones with a focus on reducing carbon footprints and protecting and enhancing biodiversity.
- 2)Here are some ideas some of which are already being undertaken by our Parish and other communities:
- Run a community 'carbon reduction forum'.
 Teach and share with each other about how our lives cause carbon dioxide emissions (transport, food, heating, fashion etc) and share ideas on how we can reduce carbon emissions that we cause (e.g. switching our electricity tariff to 100% renewable, installation of more insulation, installation of solar panels and heat pumps, try and reuse and fix than chuck and replace, consume less, source more locally,

- consider dietary changes, travel less by plane and car etc....
- Give nature a helping hand (protect and enhance biodiversity) through tree planting (e.g. the new Bright's Orchard), 're-wilding' gardens and verges (e.g. MHHL wild flower verge initiative), protecting our woods (Portal Woods group), protecting our SSI (Martlesham Conservation Group). Consider putting this under the 'WildEast' banner targeting 20% of land including gardens to be 're-wilded'.
- Run a Martlesham Repair café.
- Embrace the 'Plastic Action Champion' initiative from East Suffolk Council by appointing champions in the parish (links to litter picking activities around the parish).
- Lobby local and national politicians for better public transport and cycle lanes.
- Pledge not to use peat in compost, reduce/ stop flying, use the bus for that shopping trip rather than jump in the car.

Our meetings are on Zoom with the next one scheduled for November 9th at 19.30. We are also planning to arrange a special Parish meeting on Climate Change soon.

MARTLESHAM CONSERVATION GROUP

The hot weather of the summer seems a dim distant memory as it has given way to much wetter weather so far this autumn. Most of the butterfly species have disappeared but there were still a few that could be seen at the beginning of October such as Red Admiral and Peacock. Indeed some butterfly species over-winter in the adult stage and take up residence in our sheds and garages, hoping to find the necessary shelter and humidity to keep going until they can reemerge in the spring. Our birdlife has changed, most of the summer migrants that came to us from Africa should have got well on their way. However we have had some migrants drop in on passage. The Ring Ouzel breeds further north on the moors and mountains of Northern England, Scotland and Wales but sometimes passes through here on its way to warmer regions such as northern and southern Africa or the Middle East where it spends the winter. One dropped into my garden for a short stay in early October and proceeded to fill up on berries

from a Cotoneaster plant in a hedge in my garden. It was pretty selective, trying some berries before rejecting them, and presumably only eating the most nutritious berries. It was also pretty cautious, disappearing deeply into the hedge if it heard or sensed a dog passing by. Hopefully its survival instincts will serve it well on its long journey to its winter residence.

Over the last year we managed to complete a very limited number of surveys but managed to cover birds in the woodland and heath, and butterflies on the heath. The Silver Studded Blue butterflies did not seem to have a good year in comparison with previous years .Unfortunately the trend of recent years seems to be continuing. Fortunately the Silver Studded Blue butterflies were found in several spots but all with very low numbers. On a more positive note Silver Studded Blues were again found on the Common, so the colony which reestablished a few years ago seems to be hanging on.

We will discuss the results of our surveys in

more detail as well as other aspects of our local wildlife at our AGM, which we intend to hold online via Zoom in mid November. Please contact me if you would like to attend.

Looking ahead we may get colder weather through the winter, please try leaving some piles of twigs and other organic material out in your gardens as a refuge for wildlife including small mammals such as hedgehogs. But please do not disturb these piles until we are well into the warmer weather of spring. Also look out for winter migrant birds on our heaths, woodlands and gardens. In previous years these included Stonechat and Dartford Warbler and visitors from further afield such as Redwings that seem to like the shelter and food resource amongst the sparse trees and heather of the heath whilst also using the puddles formed after winter rain to take a drink.



REMEMBRANCE DAY 1940

This was a memorable day in the life of the Heath. There was a lull after the hectic days of the

"Battle of Britain", in which Martlesham Heath had played its part and had been host to many of the outstanding personalities of the conflict.

It was a memorable day because on November 11th 1940, the Italian Air Force mounted an attack against England and Hurricanes from Martlesham were involved in intercepting them.

British Intelligence was aware of the presence of Italian Air Force units operating from airfields formerly occupied by the Luftwaffe. However, little was known until an Italian aviation magazine published the news that an "Italian Expeditionary Force" was established along the Channel coast, with other units operating from Belgium.

"Corps Aerio Italiano"

The force was named as the "Corps Aerio Italiano, (Italian Air Corps) and the estimated strength was between 300 and 400 aircraft including fighters, fighter-reconnaissance, fighter-bombers and bombers. Later, when some of these machines had been shot down, RAF Intelligence were of the opinion that they belonged to the First Air Fleet, from Milan.

The Italian press reported victories over the RAF Hurricanes and Spitfires and also claimed that they had bombed London. At this time no Italian aircraft had been brought down over the mainland and it appears that the extent of their operations consisted of some spying flights in the Dover area, whilst a few were engaged on nuisance flights over Southern England at night.

Martlesham fighters scrambled

On Armistice Day, November 11th 1940, after being inspected by many high-ranking officers, the cream of the Corps Aerio Italiano were briefed to set out on a major strike against the UK. The formation comprised 10 Fiat BR20 twin-engine bombers, which were equivalent to the RAF Whitley, and 40 Fiat CR42 fighters, which were biplanes in the Gloster Gladiator class. Their target was harbour installations at Harwich. Bawdsey and Gt. Bromley radar had detected the force and RAF Fighters from Hornchurch, North Weald and Martlesham were scrambled. No. 257 Squadron from Martlesham claimed 5 BR20's and 2 CR42's destroyed. They also claimed, 1 BR20 and 3 CR42's damaged. No. 46(F) and 245 (F) Squadrons from North



Weald claimed a further 2 BR20's and 3 CR42's as probables.

Flight Lt. Blatchford led 257 Squadron from Martlesham that day as the CO, Sqd.ldr. Stanford-Tuck was off duty. They made rendezvous with 46 Squadron over the North Sea at 12000ft. The aircraft were sighted in a tight "vic" formation surrounded by the fighters. The bombers made for cloud cover but the Hurricanes were in pursuit. One BR20 bomber, whose pilot was probably shot, performed its first and last loop before diving into the sea. Flt.Lt. Blatchford had caught the upper main plane of a CR42 with his propeller. Nevertheless, with a badly vibrating engine he made repeated dummy runs against the other Fiats, which turned and flew back to the Continent. He said afterward that it was the best party he had been to! One CR42 spiralled and landed on the shingle beach at Orford Ness and was only slightly damaged. This machine can now be seen in the RAF Museum at Hendon. Another CR42 was badly damaged when it landed in a ploughed field at Corton, near Lowestoft. A BR20 bomber was chased inland towards Woodbridge and with a propeller missing, made a forced landing in Tangham forest near the present RAF Woodbridge base.

Champagne, Chianti and cheese

These were the first Tuscan enemies to land on English soil since the Romans, nearly 2000 years ago. A bottle of Champagne, a bottle of Chianti and a 5lb cheese and cheese grater were rescued from the bomber and were much appreciated when they appeared on the menu at the officers mess at Martlesham that evening!

On November 23rd a further force of Italian aircraft attacked a convoy in the North Sea and lost 7 more aircraft. This was the last recorded action by the Italians.

Was this all a costly propaganda stunt? Did Mussolini really believe that the Italian Air Force could do better than the hard-hitting Luftwaffe, with its much more superior aircraft and crews, had failed to do?

Martlesham Heath Aviation Society SERVICE of REMEMBRANCE

MARTLESHAM HEATH SURGERY -PRACTICE AND PATIENT GROUP (PPG)

(Also of interest to patients of The Birches practice in Kesgrave)

In July 2019, I reported on the rumours about Martlesham Heath surgery closing with GP services being run from The Birches practice in Kesgrave. We invited the local Clinical Commissioning Group to a PPG meeting to explain to us what impact they expected the new housing developments to have on the future of primary care. They told us that any decisions were many years off being decided, but that various options were being considered. This summer, the same rumours are out there. so this is to explain our current understanding.

In 2018/19, both the Martlesham Heath practice and The Birches joined a consortium of 13 GP practices across Suffolk called Suffolk Primary Care (SPC). The consortium describes itself as "An innovative new partnership with like-minded Suffolk GP surgeries covering 130,000 patients. The collaboration will see doctors and other practice staff sharing resources and working together to ensure patients continue to receive high quality healthcare." The way this consortium operates is that there is a management board and some back-office functions have been centralised, including management of the website, but each practice continues to operate independently within the overall structure. Since the Martlesham and Kesgrave surgeries are located near each other, a closer collaboration has evolved between the two and this was particularly necessary during the lockdown, when one operated as a Covid site and the other as a non-Covid site. We also now share a practice manager who works half the week at each location.

We are very grateful to Paul Brown, CEO of SPC for attending our last two PPG meetings, as we remain concerned about the future of our practice in relation to the future housing developments. He advised us that closer

collaboration between Martlesham and Kesgrave practices will continue, but no decisions have been made on longer-term arrangements. The options we heard before are still there. These include:

- · retaining both practices to cater for increasing demand
- looking at options to expand one or both premises
- creating a single larger practice on one site, not necessarily an existing site.

From what we heard from the CCG and again recently, it seems very unlikely that a brand new medical centre will be built at Brightwell Lakes, as it would be more cost effective to build up the existing practices. However, we can't say for certain that won't ever happen.

Right now, we have been assured that there are no plans to close Martlesham Heath surgery, the Birches practice in Kesgrave is not taking over or amalgamating with the Martlesham Heath surgery, but the two practices are working together more closely in order to share resources when that is helpful. We don't yet know how this situation will evolve over the next 3-5 years. On behalf of all our patients, we will maintain an active interest and participate in discussions about this and will let you know when we know anything more definite.

In the light of closer collaboration, I am now in touch with my opposite number at The Birches and have agreed that we will share information and maybe collaborate on projects where this would save duplication of effort.

We are planning to conduct a patient survey and next month (hopefully) you will be invited to give us feedback on various communication methods for patients. Although the survey will be conducted together, the results will be analysed separately, so each practice will see the results for their patients. Our PPG is leading on this project.


