



Tree of the Month – Eucalyptus, Eucalyptus gunnii

This magnificent eucalyptus tree can be seen to the rear of Westland, Martlesham Heath on the edge of the western corridor. At approximately 25m tall, it is a notable feature of the area, providing a habitat for many different birds and mammals.

Eucalyptus gunnii, commonly known as cider gum, is a species of large evergreen tree native to the island of Tasmania, Australia. Of note are the elliptic or eggshaped grey to bluish- green leaves which are fragrant and give off essential oils when they are creased or burned, a favourite with florists and flower arrangers. Many thanks to a local resident for bringing this wonderful tree to the attention of the Tree Wardens.

On a regular basis we are asked questions about a whole host of different issues with regards to Martlesham Heath. About 90% of these queries could be resolved by simply looking at the MHHL website. Tree Policy

Martlesham Heath Householders Limited (MHHL) is responsible for maintaining many trees throughout Martlesham Heath village and has four primary aims with regards to the management and maintenance of its tree stock as follows:

1. Reduce, and maintain at as lower level as reasonably possible, the risk from the existing tree stock to persons and property

- 2. Preserve the existing tree stock
- 3. Enhance the existing tree stock
- 4. Comply with legal obligations

Intervention will only be undertaken when there is a genuine and justifiable benefit to be gained from an arboricultural perspective that complies with one or more of the four primary aims.

Competent and qualified arboriculturalists undertake regular systematic inspections and report their findings to MHHL, including the specification and priority of any works required. The trees on MHHL land are divided into two zones. Zone one (high use) is where there is frequent public access to trees and Zone two (lower use) is where trees are not subject to frequent public access. Where any potentially actionable health and safety defects are identified, the arboriculturalist will consider the severity of the defect, the location of the tree and the hazard consequences of the defect. They will then ascribe a priority of response to address the matter of concern. Health and safety and legal obligations are always going to be MHHL's highest priority thus ensuring the safety of all those who enjoy the woods. Please refer to www.mhhl.co.uk

Martlesham in Bloom



Summer weather, sunny and dry, came earlier than usual in March and April, meaning lots of shrubs and trees have already or are already flowering.

Some native plants such as bluebells have also come into bud and started flowering early in places. Remember to water any herbaceous plants, shrubs and trees which you have in containers particularly if the weather stays warm and dry. Now will also be a good time to give them a feed with fertilizer to help them grow as many will have put on leaf, started to grow and either be flowering or developing flower buds.

If May continues to be dry and warm many annual plants that you have sown and are growing on maybe getting bigger, seedlings can be planted up into bigger pots undercover to encourage them to grow ready for planting out later. Be careful of planting these out too soon into the garden because there may possibly be a few cold nights when they will suffer if left outside unprotected. It is worth hardening them off first by putting them out during the day and either bringing them in at night, putting them under protection, or covering them with horticultural fleece at night and doing this for a couple of weeks so they get used to conditions ready to put out in the garden end of May early June. If you do plant them out be prepared to protect them at night in situ whenever it is cold.

Lots of seeds can be sown in May to give you a succession of flowers for you to enjoy and to ensure that there is a good supply of nectar and pollen for the insects over the coming months. Cosmos, borage, nasturtiums, nightscented stocks, candytuft and nigella can all be sown where you want them to grow and flower, either the open ground or in containers. Another sowing of all the bean family now can help with a succession of flowers for bees to pollinate and therefore food for you.


The activity sheets usually include a story, song and a craft or game about a theme or a story from the Bible.

MARTLESHAM WILDS

Spring is coming, blossom is looking glorious in our hedgerows and the dawn chorus is hotting up as bird breeding season gets going! At Martlesham Wilds the beautiful songs of skylarks and woodlarks can be heard all the time. The woodlarks Latin name is Lullula arborea, as the song is often described as a "lu-lu-lu". The Skylark has a stunning melodious warble, performed during a high, hovering flight. Can you recognise both songs as you walk?

It is especially important at this time of year to be aware of the disturbance dogs can cause to both of these, and other, ground nesting birds – birds may abandon their nests if they are feeling unsafe - so please do help us to look after our wildlife by keeping dogs on leads on our reserves, and helping to spread the word.

We are waiting to see what bursts into flower this year in the ex-arable fields. Before the knapweed appeared last year, there was a wonderful array of arable wild-flowers, and we wonder if this year will be any different. We will be starting flora surveys soon to continue with the monitoring of how the site changes and develops. Watch this space!

You may have seen a new bridge just off the footpath next to the grazing marshes. This has been put in for the new King Charles III Coast Path. There is no access across it yet, but it is coming soon and we hope the path will be open this year.

MARTLESHAM HEATH AVIATION SOCIETY

Yet another very well attended monthly meeting.

Pieter Shipster gave a wonderful talk on the Schneider Trophy and had prepared a wonderful amount of information on the subject both verbal and visual which took place between 1913 and 1931 complete with some relevant news reel clips of the trophy races. The Schneider Trophy is close to RAF Martlesham Heath and to the then, Felixstowe Naval Air Service which is now of course Felixstowe Docks.

This was not a race, it was a time trial by each plane and was open to float and seaplanes only. Countries included the USA, Italy, France, Britain and even Switzerland during one year. The event was later held every two years and there were rules regarding the planes. The winner of the competition was presented with the trophy and held it for the two years. The rules stipified that should a country win the trophy on three consecutives occasions then that country would be allowed to hold the trophy for good.

Britain won the competition in 1927 by Flt Lt Sidney Webster an RAF Martlesham pilot and, at that time a player and captain of the Ipswich Town Football Club (an amateur club at that time) flying a Supermarine S5 designed by RJ Mitchell with a Rolls Royce engine. In 1929 Britain again won the competition this time by Flt Lt Richard Waghorn, yet another RAF Martlesham pilot, in a Supermarine Rolls Royce engined S6 and in 1931 Flt Lt John Boothman yet another RAF Martlesham pilot completed the hatrick in a Rolls Royce engined Supermarine S.6B. The trophy now belonged to the Britain and is on display in the Science Museum London, but it could have been very different. The Air Ministry decided not to fund the 1931 British contingent. Thankfully Lady Lucy Houston who wanted Britain to win the trophy provided the £100,000 which allowed the British team to take part.

Thought for the month.

I'll start this month with an admission.

I find these articles quite difficult to write. What to write about? How many words? Then self-doubt kicks in and I ask... Does anyone read it? Do people have preconceived idea about what is written and just skip it?

Many years ago, I worked at Blockbuster Video in Loughborough. It was one of the biggest stores in the country, we had literally thousands of films all neatly arranged on shelves for customers to browse. Customers would walk up and down the aisles, looking at the VHS front covers, if the cover grabbed their attention, they would pick it up and have a look at the back for the synopsis and then decide if they wanted to watch the film.

Frequently, people would ask for recommendations, I would offer a few choices depending on what genre of film that wanted to watch. Often, 3 days later when the film had to be returned, the person would say something like 'it wasn't what I was expecting' or 'it was better than I thought it was going to be' or sometimes 'no, it wasn't for me'. The point is, they would never have engaged with what was inside the box, without being specifically invited to do so, and would have perhaps ignored it, because they thought they knew what the film was like, based on a quick glance.

So, the thought for the month is this. To what level have you read the Bible? Have you just had a look at the cover and ignored it? Have you had a look at a page or two and then put it down? Have you read it cover to cover? If you've never really read it, I invite you to read 'the most read book in human history' and make your own mind up. If you do, don't start at page 1. Go to one of the four stories of Jesus's life. Either Matthew, Mark, Luke, or John. Or get in touch, and we can put a reading plan together.
