Salix babylonica is a medium to large sized deciduous tree which can grow to 25m tall. Whilst it grows rapidly, it has a short lifespan of between 40 and 75 years. The leaves are alternate, long, narrow and light green. They turn gold-yellow in autumn. In early spring, slender catkins are produced. Branches and twigs are pendulous or 'weeping' in nature, often reaching the ground. Salix is known for attracting bees, birds, moths and butterflies. It is a caterpillar food plant and provides shelter and habitat

Make a pond, it does not have to be big and provide much needed water for drinking and bathing.

UPDATE FROM SUFFOLK EAST DISTRICT COUNCILLOR MARK PACKARD

In February I was delighted to be invited by Charlotte to Martlesham Pre School in Deben Avenue, Martlesham Heath. The school is a run by a charity and is a really welcoming and busy place. Nicola is the Head and I also met Danielle and Rachel who look after the children. See photo below. The school is very active at fundraising and has a full compliment of boys and girls. After hearing of their plans for the future I was impressed with the outside space and their plan to upgrade their sandpit. I had some money available in my Community Grant Fund and have put in an application to help fund the sandpit.

I was also present at the Community Partnership meeting held recently at Tuddenham St Martin Village Hall where £9,700 was voted to Martlesham Parish Council towards their plan to create a wildlife corridor between Martlesham and the Martlesham Wilds Space. The funds are voted on by Parish Councillors from Rushmere St Andrew, Carlford and Fynn Valley, so that includes villages like Bealings, Grundisburgh and as far away as Charlsfield. The idea is to create a sensory landscape on an existing grassed area that will stimulate the senses and bring a calming, welcoming space to the natural countryside. Developing the Playground Area so that it attracts residents from both Martlesham and the surrounding villages will make the area more alive and contemporary so I am fully supportive of the Parish Council's plan.

Tree Survey

One of the enjoyable things about living on Martlesham Heath is the rich abundance of trees of various types. However, not only are we all getting a bit older but the many trees that abound Martlesham Heath are also getting older. The problem is that we are now faced with the fact that some of the older trees have suffered damage and need attention. This is especially due to the recent winter storms that we have experienced. After much discussion it was felt that in order to avoid accidents that could occur with falling branches and trees it was necessary to complete a survey of the trees throughout Martlesham Heath in order to get to grips with the severity of the problem and take the necessary action. This survey has been completed recently and we are now getting rid of any dangerous branches and trees. If you are out walking in the woods and see work ongoing, please don't go near.

Woodland Tidy Up

We reported last month of the tidy up work that had been carried out in Birchwood's by volunteers. We are delighted to report that many residents have commented on how much easier they have found the paths as the silver birch logs have defined where the paths are whilst the leaves are on the ground. Also, the first tree survey, at our request, focused on the defined and much used pathways. If you deviate from these areas, please be careful as the trees in these areas are still to be assessed.

Tree Planting

By the time you read this MHHL will have planted 28 saplings to replace trees that we have lost over the past year. These are all native species namely Wild Cherry, Common Beech, Hornbeam, Field Maple, and Hazel. We are trying to add some spring blossom and autumn berries around the village to add a bit of colour and help the wildlife. If you find we have put a tree sapling near you, could you kindly water it in periods of drought until it is established. We would like to thank Jane Hall, a Martlesham Parish Councillor and one of the Suffolk Tree Wardens, who kindly arranged the supply of these saplings free of charge.

Volunteers

This is a call to any residents who would like to volunteer a bit of time. It is important that a good base of volunteers is maintained. Spring is here

Now we are into April there is lots of wildlife to see and enjoy in our outdoor spaces. Bird nesting is well underway; look out for birds making the most of your outdoor space for food, nest materials, and/or nest sites. If you need to do any minor pruning of vegetation be careful not to disturb nesting birds (which is illegal). Major work should be done wherever possible during autumn and winter, outside of the main bird nesting season from around February to August, (although different species vary and changing climate is affecting timings).

Other wildlife you may spot or see signs of, in the form of their 2-5cm long dark, cylindrical droppings, are hedgehogs who will be busy building up body fat they lost during hibernation. They will be hungry so do not clear up all your garden leaves and wood piles - the invertebrates they harbour such as slugs will be enjoyed by hedgehogs, who are a gardener's best friend, and there may still be hedgehogs asleep under them. You can also help by ensuring there are gaps for them, (15cms by 15 cms), through garden boundaries.

Wildlife really brings an outdoor space to life. Many invertebrates spend winter hidden from view as eggs, larvae or adults but can now be seen out and about, bumblebees, beefly and shieldbugs for example.

While you enjoy the wildlife and beautiful spring blooms you can think ahead to summer with annuals that can be sown in April, such as sunflowers, nasturtium, cornflowers and borage. All can be sown indoors then grown on to be planted out later. If you choose varieties that have flowers with a single form (i.e. you can see the flower's centre, unlike doubles which are made up completely of petals) they will provide us with colour, pollinating insects with pollen and nectar and some, like sunflowers will provide seeds for birds to eat in situ or for us to harvest and feed to them.

There is food for us to think about too! If you would like to grow tomatoes outside this summer April is the perfect time to sow seed indoors ready to grow on and plant out at the beginning of June.

Martlesham Conservation Group

The Martlesham Heath (SSSI) on the western side of the village is an example of dry lowland heath(the rarest type of habitat in Europe), which should ideally be dominated by heathers with a mix of other low growing plants including fine grasses. Much of the work of the Group is involved in conserving this habitat for wildlife but also helping to support good public access. On our last work party in March we filled in holes in the central part of the heath and cut back the encroaching brambles and other scrub along several paths We would like to thank all the members who helped on our recent work parties and also those who gave up their time and effort on the Megabash that took place in February. Also we give our thanks to the Greenways project for their support on the last Megabash and continuing support over many years.

Members of the public, especially dog walkers can make a valuable contribution to the conservation of our heathland and its associated wildlife by sticking to the main paths. The areas cleared in the winter could be colonised by ground nesting birds and reptiles especially if the disturbance level could be kept low. Please stick to the main paths, and if you are a dog walker we strongly advise you to walk your dog on a lead and stick to the main paths. This is partly for the benefit of our local wildlife but also for the protection of your dog as we seem to have a good population of adders present on the heath based on the numbers seen last year. Please don't be tempted to take short cuts across the open areas, and please remember all our British snakes and lizards are protected by law. For more information about reptiles (and amphibians) try the website https://www.arc-trust.org.

In April, we should see the major influx of migrant birds with more varied song such as from the Nightingale, Whitethroat, Garden Warbler and Lesser Whitethroat. Please listen out for these birds on our heaths and woodlands this year, and enjoy the rich soundscape of their birdsong. Later in the month if the weather warms up we may begin to see more butterflies which may include the Green Hairstreak, Brimstone and Orange Tip, adding colour and movement to the landscape.

Our next work party will be on Sunday 7th April at 10am. Please meet on the Martlesham Heath SSSI next to the bank that runs east-west across the site(along the path from the sign board between Heathfield and The Oaks. We will be creating small patches of bare ground for the benefit of solitary bees and wasps, reptiles, butterflies and some birds that light to eat seeds off the ground. In May we will be conducting some birds surveys.

Martlesham Climate Action

'Climate Change: what can we do?'

Following our climate event in March, here is a list of actions and behaviour changes you might consider, reducing your own personal impact on carbon emissions along with rough annual carbon emission estimates. The average person in the UK is responsible for around 8-10 tonnes of carbon per year mainly through their diet, consumer spending, energy use and travel (basically using and consuming things that involve burning fossil fuels). If we all start changing it will have a significant impact.

- 1. Go car free (2 tonnes)
- Reduce/stop flying (one trip London New York is nearly 2 tonnes, London – Rome 0.5 tonnes)
- 3. Switch your electricity to a renewable supplier (1.6 tonnes)
- 4. Reduce/eliminate food waste (0.3 tonnes)
- 5. Try Vegan or Vegetarian diet or at least reduce meat consumption (0.2-0.8 tonnes)
- 6. Eat local food (0.3 tonnes)
- Insulate your home as best you can (up to 0.9 tonnes by saving heating bills)
- 8. Reduce buying new clothes (0.2 tonnes)
- 9. Working from home (0.7 tonnes)
- 10. High active travel i.e., cycling/walking/ public transport (0.8 tonnes)
- 11. Recycling/buy refills (0.2 tonnes)
- 12.Install solar PV panels (1 tonne)
- 13.Replace fossil heating e.g., gas boiler with a heat pump (1 tonne)
- 14. Replace old fossil fuel car with EV (2

tonnes if you do an average/high mileage) but better to reduce car use completely!

- 15. Think carefully about pets (no pets = 0.5 tonnes)
- 16.Plant 10 trees (10 years to save 1 tonne)

Why not choose some actions/changes? Aim to save around 4 tonnes by 2030. You can then tell the next generations you did your best!

The carbon estimates are based on research published by the University of Essex.

Springtime! March '24.

Spring is in the air and as the winter bird surveys wind up, the breeding bird surveys begin! The changes on site are subtle but already happening – the weedy stubbles have been left over winter, and the last of the heavy machinery work, to disc any deeply furrowed fields, took place in February.

During last year's breeding season there were an estimated 11 skylark territories, and we can only imagine that with all the additional, undisturbed areas that this year there will be even more, along with other ground nesting birds like meadow pipits. Recently there has been a woodlark singing in the eastern part of the reserve, and flocks of golden plover, curlew and lapwing roosting on some of the fields nearer to the river.

Work parties have begun, mainly repairing fences on the marshes in anticipation of the beginning of the grazing season and we are very lucky to be having 22 Belted Galloways this year, helping to maintain and perhaps improve floristic diversity. Although this year they will not be grazing next to the footpath, you will be able to see them in the distance as you cross the marsh onto the river wall.

Volunteers have also been busy with the task of removing old spiro-guards from hedges - an uncomfortable but gratifying job!

Preparations are now underway for this year's survey season; training for butterfly and soil surveys will start in the next weeks, and there will be more to come.

MORE MARTLESHAM WILDS NEWS

Thanks to a generous grant of £340,453 from Biffa Award, Suffolk Wildlife Trust can begin the vital conservation works and habitat creation, which will help to boost nature's recovery across the reserve. As thickets of hawthorn, blackthorn, gorse and wild rose establish on the dry sandy soils, they will support growing flocks of linnets and yellowhammers, and in time we hope nightingale will return. Small mammals will thrive in the dense undergrowth and insects will abound. Grass snakes, slow worms and common lizards will expand into the new areas of habitat and barn owls will come a regular sight at dusk. This 'wilded' land will become part of a connected landscape of ancient woodland, scrub, grassland and saltings, linked by the River Deben.

The funding from Biffa Award will support a range of works across the nature reserve including:

- The building of livestock shelters, fencing and troughs for the grazing animals that are being introduced to the reserve for conservation grazing,
- The purchase of surveying and monitoring equipment that will enable reserve staff and volunteers to carry out essential wildlife surveys as the nature recovers and reestablishes on the reserve,
- The creation of habitats across the reserve to kick-start "rewilding" of the site, including ponds, invertebrate banks, scrapes, lagoons, and foot drains,
- The installation of species surveying platforms to enable staff, volunteers, and visitors to observe wildlife and the landscape as it returns to nature

Karen Bainbridge, Volunteer at Suffolk Wildlife Trust who has led many guided walks of Martlesham Wilds says:

"The news of funding for infrastructure work at Martlesham Wilds is fantastic. As an Engagement Volunteer, jointly leading Discovery Walks for members of the public, it means I will be passing on the message that Suffolk Wildlife Trust can now begin conservation and habitat work on the site."

MARTLESHAM HEATH AVIATION SOCIETY

Bruce Macpherson presented: "The Kings and Giants of Rendlesham Forest". This is the story of the USAF 67th Aerospace Recovery and Rescue Squadron".

Bruce gave a fascinating and detailed report of his time flying the Lockheed Hercules – mostly from RAF Woodbridge, but very occasionally from Keflavik in Iceland – in the Recovery and Rescue role.

The history of the Unit started in 1952 Justly proud of his time in the service he started his talk by going through his training – much of which was pretty much the same as a fighter pilot. As with all pilots he started with the basics, and eventually aimed for pilot selection – which was, for him, flying the Lockeed Hercules Transport. He outlined the hard working required to graduate.

Some of the other pilots, destined to become Fighter Pilots, sometimes used a hybrid version of the T-38 Trainer in dummy dog-fights. These fighter pilots often went on to use the F5 "Aggressor" at Alconbury, touring Europe providing air-to-air Combat Training for United States Air Force Europe pilots.Bruce had started to specialise on the Lockheed C130 Hercules. First designed in the 1960's, with latest versions still produced by the Lockheed Aircraft Company. He eventually trained to use the specialised HC-130P/N version.

Throughout his years on this aircraft, he moved around a lot. In Britain he recalled going to Prestwick and Alconbury – with most of his time at RAF Woodbridge.In his time with the 67th – he worked with the HH3 "Jolly Green Giant" helicopter. Many in the large audience recalled seeing these flying around Suffolk.

Bruce then talked about some of the rescue missions which his unit undertook – including the lifting of a fisherman from a Russian Trawler way out in the Atlantic.... with very tricky air-toair refuelling required in dreadful weather conditions.

The Unit was also involved in aerial rescue duties in case the Presidential Airforce One ever came down as it flew across the North Atlantic – the main role of the Hercules was continual aerial refuelling of the HH3 Helicopter way out in the Atlantic.... As the President's aircraft passed overhead.

Bruce then talked us through the technique of air-to-air refuelling. He had the help of a friend/ colleague Mark Service, from RAF Mildenhall. They used a funnel and a bit of hose, (the donor aircraft) and a probe (the recipient) to demonstrate with some hilarity the technique involved.... of a Hercules flying real slow refuelling a very large HH3 helicopter going as fast as it could!

Finally, Bruce talked about his time at the USAFA (United States Air Force Academy), – where he obtained has degree. This is the equivalent of The US Army West Point Academy.

His talk to a very large and appreciative audience, continues the trend of our talks just getting better and better. It was given in a very friendly style – with a lot of humour. It was also obvious that Bruce was enjoying himself.

The next meeting is on Friday April at 7:30pm, when Terry Holloway (who coincidentally worked at the Lockheed Europe facility at Marshalls of Cambridge), will be talking about his time with the Royal Air Force, especially his time with an RAF Team flying over Chile and Peru. His talk is entitled "Flight over the Andes".

Finally – it is worth noting that our Martlesham Heath Control Tower Museum reopens for the 2024 Season on Sunday afternoon 7th April from 2:00 to 4:30. Come along and see what we have been up to over the winter...
