

Tree of the Month - Common Lime, Tilia x europaea

This magnificent row of limes can be found bordering St Mary's Church carpark in Martlesham.

The common lime is a natural hybrid between the small-leaved lime and the large-leaved lime. The bark is pale grey-brown and irregularly ridged. The fragrant clusters of yellowy-white flowers open in July, leaves are dark green, heart-shaped and flimsy. Once pollinated by insects, the flowers develop into round-oval fruits with a pointed tip. Lime honey is prized by beekeepers.

Neighbourhood Watch

We have registered for a Martlesham wide Neighbourhood Watch Scheme, headed by the Parish Council, and are in the process of applying to highways for the use of their posts on which to display the scheme signs. We will keep you up to date with our progress via our website.

Nature For Us All Project Kronji's Piece, The Street, Martlesham

We are pleased to confirm that work on the 'Nature for us all' project has been full steam ahead over the summer months. By the time of going to print, we are hoping to be working on the additional features included in the plan.

This phase of the project, near to the carpark, includes an accessible path and seating area. Shallow swales provide surface water drainage tying in with future potential car park and track improvements; they also provide different conditions for wild plants. Soil from the works is being kept on site by creating low mounds that wrap around the seats and path and bring the grass, wildflowers, and insect life nearer to eye level. The existing wildflower and grass seeds in the soil will be allowed to grow. In the future some of the grass areas will be left uncut over the summer months. encouraging wildflowers and wildlife. Additional features will gradually be added after the hard landscaping and earthworks are completed, as the project progresses.

Update from Jenny Riddell-Carpenter MP

Over the past few months, I've been working with colleagues in Parliament to take a closer look at how national policy reflects life in rural areas. Too often, decisions made in Westminster are shaped by the needs of towns and cities, and don't always reflect the reality of living in rural places like Suffolk Coastal.

To help change that, I've helped to establish - and now chair - a new group in Parliament: the Labour Rural Research Group. This group brings together Labour MPs who represent rural or semi-rural areas, and aims to ensure rural communities are properly understood and reflected in national policy. As I said in my recent East Anglian Daily Times opinion piece, successive governments – of all political persuasions, and for



many decades – have had a 'rural blind spot' and they've failed to grasp the realities of rural Britain, and the challenges of delivering public services or driving investment into our rural communities.

Our first report, Understanding Rural Britain, published in August and available on my website, draws on the views and experiences of

As someone who grew up here and moved away, only to return in my late 30s, this resonates with me deeply. I know we need to do more to create (and sustain) opportunities for young people in places like Suffolk Coastal and Suffolk as a whole.

Our next area of work will explore rural poverty and how we best tackle it, and I'll be working with local and national partners to make sure our experiences here in Suffolk Coastal are properly heard and understood.

Your payments are vital and will go towards the ongoing work in the woods, the village greens, the SSSI area and ad hoc repairs and maintenance etc.

Selling Your Property?

A reminder for anyone selling or buying a property on Martlesham Heath that the rule of who is liable to pay the annual maintenance fee is as follows.

The person that owns the property at midnight on 1st October is responsible for paying the full annual maintenance fee. So, it will depend on your completion date. If the sale completes on 1st October or before the buyers pay the full charge. If the sale completes on 2 October or afterwards the sellers pay the full charge. MHHL does not get involved in splitting the charge between buyer and seller.

Martlesham in Bloom



Colour and creatures!

October is a wonderful time to enjoy autumn colour on deciduous trees, shrubs and some grasses and herbaceous plants too; in many ways it can be the most colourful time of year!

Thinking of future colour in your garden or outdoor space, October is an ideal month to plant many of the late winter and spring flowering bulbs such as snowdrops, crocus, daffodils, grape hyacinth, hyacinths, and native bluebells, plus Alliums for early summer. If you would like to grow tulips they are best planted in November to reduce the risk of the fungal disease tulip fire. Having a mixture of different species in borders, containers and/or baskets will help you have cheery colour throughout the seasons. Many of these flowers are also appreciated by bees and other pollinators, especially important during the early part of the year when early bees are on the wing and few flowers are out.

This is a great time of year to help garden wildlife, big and small. Fallen leaves can be left as mulch on bare areas of your borders to insulate and protect the ground, feed the soil and your plants as they break down, and provide a wonderful leaf litter habitat for a variety of mini beasts, which in turn feed other animals such as birds! If you have any twigs, branches, logs or pruning's these can be made into loose piles (avoid stacking piles up against tree or shrub trunks) or attractive sculptural features such as wigwam shaped structures, with smaller twigs and fallen leaves pushed into the middle - an opportunity to be creative! These will provide cosy, overwintering locations for various stages of insects and other invertebrates, plus larger wildlife such as newts, frogs and hedgehogs. Even small piles help.

If you have any logs from broadleaved trees (i.e. not conifers) that are at least as wide as an adult's arm you have an ideal opportunity to provide for stag beetles, whose larvae spend three to seven years at or below ground level feeding on decaying wood. They are nationally rare, found in southeast England including south east Suffolk. Partially bury logs upright in the soil in lines or groups, approximately 50cms deep.

All these features can add to the attractiveness and biodiversity of our gardens and outdoor spaces creating healthy, happy, rich garden ecosystems.

Changes at Martlesham WIlds

There are exciting things developing at Martlesham Wilds. We now have 5 new ponds around the nature reserve which are already filling with water and providing habitats and drinking water for many creatures – we know nature likes to move fast sometimes, but this has surprised us already.

We also have a new freshwater area down on the marshes for wading birds to rest, feed and potentially nest. These shallow areas are called 'Scrapes' and have been dug where water naturally puddles to improve the diversity of habitats down on the marshes. It's really interesting to see how the birds find these spaces immediately.





shows a very dry and featureless marsh, which has little use to wildlife. This is what the marsh has looked like for many years.

The second picture shows very simple changes, and work in progress, where the top layer is literally scraped away to create shallow freshwater areas to make more of a marshy area for wildlife.

The bottom picture shows how we hope this area would look in the future - a much more natural and exciting landscape for wildlife with scrapes, wet areas, and lots of muddy edges.

Martlesham Conservation Group

Many thanks to all those who came along to our work parties on the heath SSSI over the summer when we cut some bracken that if left unchecked would submerge areas of heather and grassland.

Bracken does not support much wildlife whereas heather and grassland supports much more wildlife because of the range of plant species and structural diversity that can be used by invertebrates, birds and reptiles.

Heathland is an ancient habitat that has been managed for for thousands of years in this country and is now rare. It will transition towards woodland if it is not managed either by grazing with animals such as sheep, horses and rabbits or by more direct management using tools and machinery. As we do not have the option of using grazing animals on our local heaths due to the high level of public access, we have to use the second approach to try to maintain and expand the tracts of heather and open landscape that are characteristic of heathland.

As we move towards winter we can begin to remove more scrubby vegetation from

the heath SSSI. Our autumn and winter cycle of scrub clearance on the heath actually begins in October and extends through to late February.

We do not usually unde

rtake scrub clearance in the spring and summer so as to avoid disturbance to nesting birds and heathland reptiles. Our work parties generally take place on the first Sunday of each month starting at 10am.

Our next work party will be on Sunday October 5th starting at 10am. Please meet at the south end of the Heath SSSI next to the bank that runs e

ast-west across the site, just along from the interpretive sign board between The Oaks and Heathfield.

We intend to remove gorse scrub from an area of more extensive heather, clip some older heather to encourage rejuvenation and then use the heather clippings to reseed the areas of scraped bare ground created last winter.

In time new young heather will develop which may be useful for Silver Studded Blue butterflies. Later in the autumn, work parties will be on Sunday November 2nd and Sunday December 7th, probably starting from the same location.

Please consider coming along and doing something practical to help the special wildlife that we are fortunate to have in our local area. We really could do with extra help because of the exceptional growth of vegetation we have experienced over last year. You will be very welcome. I am happy to discuss what would be involved. Please get in touch.

MARTLESHAM HEATH AVIATION SOCIETY

On Friday 5th September Catherine
Buchanan gave a fascinating talk – looking
at some of the people involved in the
formation of one of the first Royal Naval
Air Stations – located at Harwich, and the
close links to the Floatplane and Seaplane
Research Establishment – eventually called
the Marine Aircraft Experimental
Establishment (MAEE), where the huge
Felixstowe Docks is now.

The people in her story in the early days all suffered from the same problem – when (before and during the Great War) they signed up – the War Office did not really know what to do with them – some in fact ended up being involved in the ill-fated Gallipoli Peninsula Campaign, but our heroes eventually ending up in the Harwich /Felixstowe area.

Not having space to give Catherine's detailed story justice, I will just mention two.

Firstly, John Cyril Porte – who eventually was in charge of the MAEE. He had joined the Navy expecting to serve in the Submarine Service – until they found out he had suffered from T.B. – not good in a cramped submarine.

He took part in a 1911 Daily Mail Air Race around Britain but crashed his Deperdussin Monoplane after 400 yards.

In 1913 he went to the 'States, and met one of the preeminent Flying Boat designers of the period – Glen Curtis.

Back in the UK in 1914 he took command of the MAEE, and modified some of The Curtis designs, one being named The "Porte Baby" reconnaissance Flying Boat. He persuaded the British Government to buy many Curtis designed Flying Boats – however Curtis had promised to pay John a commission for every Flying Boat sold... this was discovered and John Cyril Porte

had to return the Commission earned and all charges were dropped. His career became somewhat blighted, which was why he was never given any honours for his undoubted good work at Felixstowe.

Catherine also mentioned Toronto born Theodore DouglasHallam. After joining the Canadian Army in 1914 he arrived in Britain – ending up at "Bustard Camp" on Salisbury Plain – doing very little. He met Hugh Trenchard– eventually to become Chief of the Air Staff in the Royal Air Force – who put Hallam on a 6 week waiting list. This eventually led to Hallam arriving at Royal Navy Air Station Harwich, where he found his niche.

To combat the German U Boat menace in the North Sea, Hallam set up a search pattern of Flying Boats based around the North Hinder Light Vessel – eventually described as "The Spiders Web", which helped manage the situation.

He eventually became Station Commander of the RNAS Felixstowe War Flight, with 5 Curtis Flying Boats – which was subsumed into the Royal Air Force when that was formed on 1st April 1918

The Martlesham Heath Aviation Society's next Monthly Meeting takes place on Friday 3rd October at 7:30 p.m.

We welcome Richard Folkes M.B.E. He has had a sparkling Career – in the Military, much of it to do with Helicopters – he then worked for Westland/Augusta... If that was not enough – The title of his talk "Camera – Action -behind the Scenes" will tell us about how he managed helicopter scenes in The Bond Film "Skyfall" and then set up the arrival of "The Queen" by parachute at the 2012 London Olympics. Doubtless details of his earlier adventures will also come to light!



Martlesham Climate Action

Battery electric vehicles (BEVs) are more affordable as the '75' registration arrives.

Market data shows that 30% of used BEVs cost below £20,000 and 3–5-year-old ones can cost less than their Internal Combustion Engine or ICE equivalent. A new Government subsidy scheme has been announced, and suppliers are offering deals on a range of new less expensive models.

Misinformation about BEVs persists: the Carbonbrief.org website is an excellent, evidence-based source of factual information. See https://interactive.carbonbrief.org/factcheck/electric-vehicles/.

Batteries are proving very durable; cars have a long warranty on the drivetrain and traction battery of typically 8 years or 100,000-150,000 miles. The AA say that for real world driving "range anxiety" is now "a thing of the past". Most daily journeys are well within the range of a BEV. For a longer trip, you'll probably need to stop before the car does, so plan comfort breaks at locations with 'rapid chargers'. it's possible to add 150+ miles of charge while you drink a coffee. Car satnavs usually have route planners that can include charging stops, or you can use a smartphone app.

If you have off-road parking and can install a home charger, an EV energy tariff makes "fuel" costs very cheap. "Destination" chargers are available at many locations where you'd park for a while. Public rapid chargers can be relatively expensive, so if you'd do most charging this way "fuel" costs could be similar to an ICE car, though the other benefits of electric driving remain.

I've had a BEV for over three years and, like most owners, won't return to a combustion engine. It's smooth and quiet. One-pedal driving uses regenerative braking, so I rarely touch the brake pedal. There are no oily bits to service, so replacing a couple of cabin air filters at three years is all that has been needed. 88% of charging has been at home, costing about 2p per mile on an EV tariff. For daily driving I plug in about once a week and have 140-250 miles of charge available of a morning. For occasional road trips, a charge to 100% offers over 300 miles on my long-range vehicle, reducing to around 250 miles in winter. I've yet to have a problem keeping the car adequately charged on road trips and holidays.

The Electric Vehicle Database (website: evdatabase.org/uk/) lists details of 772 EV models available in the UK (at time of writing). Try a test drive and you might be pleasantly surprised!

MARTLESHAM HEATH SURGERY Patient and Practice Group (PPG) News

As autumn begins, we thought we would share some useful information on getting a BloodTest and receiving the results. Blood Tests are not routinely offered at the surgery for most patients, only patients who are unable to attend another location are generally able to book to have a blood test at the surgery. Adult Blood Tests and 11-16 years of age Blood Tests are provided at either Ipswich Hospital or ESNEFT Phlebotomy Clinic at Ravenswood Health Centre (Ipswich).

Children's Blood Tests are only provided at Ipswich Hospital, the surgery is unable to provide Children's Blood Test services

If you are requested to get a Blood Test by a clinician at the surgery, the hospital or by another NHS clinician you will typically be asked to book online via www.swiftqueue.co.uk/userlogin.php You can use your NHS (App) Login Details to access this service.

If you are unable to book online you can call 0300 303 5299 If you cannot find a suitable appointment online or by the booking service, because you have been told to get it urgently and there are no dates available. You can request the surgery to book you an appointment as they have a surgery access route with short notice appointments via swiftqueue. This should only be used in cases of difficulty.

You can only book a Blood Test once you have been asked to book a Blood Test by your clinician, as if the request has not been made you will not be able to receive the blood test on arrival at the test centre. Once you have had your blood test, you will usually only be contacted if there is a cause for concern with your results. It's generally a case of "no news is good news", although if you want to find your results you can either look at you NHS App or call the surgery after 2pm a week or later after your blood test appointment.

Thought for the month.


