



Coronavirus Update (circumstances may have changed by the time you read this)

Spring is in the air, the numbers of people who have been vaccinated are going up and the number of people in hospital is going down, children are back in school and restrictions are just starting to ease. There are reasons to be hopeful for better times. It is nonetheless important to continue following the guidance on 'hands, face, space'; to look after ourselves and others.

The government expects the 'stay at home' rule will end on 29 March, but many restrictions will remain in place. All being well, from 29 March, outdoor gatherings (including in private gardens) of either 6 people (the Rule of 6) or 2 households will be allowed, making it easier for friends and families to meet outside.

The message is still that people should continue to work from home where they can and minimise the number of journeys they make where possible, avoiding travel at the busiest times and routes. The Parish Council staff will therefore carry on working from home and Council meetings will still be virtual.

Outdoor sports facilities are being allowed to reopen from 29 March so hopefully our trim trail equipment will be ready & available for you to use!

Grant to Martlesham Heath Surgery

The Parish Council was pleased to purchase 4 divider screens for the Surgery, working with the Practice & Patient Group. This makes it possible to have more patients in the waiting room, rather than standing outside, and we understand this has already made a big difference to the practice and its patients.

Harry Higgins Play Area Refurbishment

The Parish Council is very pleased to be supporting the Pavilion Management Committee's project to replace the play equipment. In March it agreed to increase its funding by a further £3,200 in order to provide high quality safety surfacing which should be hard wearing, long-lasting and attractive.

Recreation Ground Survey 2021

A big thank you to all those that took part in the Recreation Ground survey that took place in January. The results are being analysed and full details will appear on the Parish Council website shortly.

A12 Scheme (A14 "Seven Hills" to A1152 Woods Lane) – Suffolk County Council (SCC) Public Consultation

This consultation ran from 9 February to 19 March 2021: www.suffolk.gov.uk/A12improvements.

The results are likely to have a major impact on the life of Martlesham residents in the years ahead. Apart from work on the A12, topics also included proposed improvements for pedestrians, cyclists and bus users, environmental impact, the potential construction of Sizewell C, tourism and the offshore energy sector. At the time of writing, the Parish Council is still working on its response, but this will be published on our website as soon as possible.

Planning Application DC/20/1036/FUL - Land East & West of The Square -

Construction of retirement apartments for the elderly, a new public car park, access, landscaping & ancillary development

This application was submitted last year in March by McCarthy & Stone. Since then the developer has submitted revised plans. The Martlesham Neighbourhood Plan acknowledges that development might come forward for the village centre and indeed supports provision of housing for older

people in Policy MAR5, however the revised plans still fail to meet all the criteria set out in Policy MAR3 Development within Martlesham Heath. The Parish Council therefore continues to object to this planning application unless outstanding issues can be resolved. You can see our full response to recent revised plans, as well as previous comments on our website. Further amendments are expected during this March with a 2-week consultation period. East Suffolk Council (ESC) as the planning authority will make the decisions on this application. The Pandemic.

The light at the end of the tunnel can now be seen. All the hard work by our wonderful National Health Service, the scientists, health workers and all those who have worked tirelessly for all our benefit are due a great vote of thanks which I am pleased to say 'Thank you'.

Communities 'Bounce Back' Fund.

The East Suffolk Communities 'Bounce Back' Fund, funded through the East Suffolk Community Partnership Board, is a grant totalling £100,000. It offers grants of They are also taking a strong interest in between £250 and £5,000 to voluntary community and social enterprise (VCSE) organisations in East Suffolk. The aim of the fund is to enable VCSE organisations to resume their previous activities safely and/ or to support them to transition to new ways of working. All VCSE groups are eligible to apply, as long as the funding requested is for equipment, adaptations or staffing to enable an existing/previous activity to resume safely or to enable a new activity/ be developed/launched. service to However, priority will be given to youth organisations/activities, organisations supporting /involving volunteers community buildings, given the particular impacts of Covid-19 on these groups.

Please note that this funding is not intended to replace lost income/hardship experienced by VCSE organisations as a result of Covid-19. ESC cannot provide retrospective funding for projects, unless it was something that has had to 'pause' due to Covid-19. Funding is available from October2020 until end of September 2021. Hydrogen Technology and Transport.

EDF who are very aware of the impact of their proposals for Sizewell C have now joined with ESC to help with a number of community projects. The company has undertaken to continue to develop Hydrogen power technology at the existing power station for use with vehicles and other energy projects.

community transport particularly in those areas that are not on the regular service routes and have allocated a specialist in transport matters to help resolve some of the issues. Currently ESC has a working group looking into ways of how the district council might be able to resolve some of the public transport problems. Coupled with these proposals is the need for road safety measures. In my meeting with their representative, I highlighted a particular hazard at the crossing point from Black Tiles lane to the bus stop and footpath for access to the retail park by walking and cycling which many are able to do. The ESC working group are hoping to deliver some positive outcomes soon.

Virtual Annual Meeting of the Parish Wednesday 21 April 2021 7.30pm

The Martlesham Parish Council Chairman, Mike Williamson, welcomes all parishioners to this meeting which gives you an opportunity to raise issues about what is happening in Martlesham. As we will not be meeting face to face, the format will be different this year without the presentation of cheques and formal reports but there will be the opportunity to hear news from local organisations & of the work of the Parish Council.

For 2021/22 the Council has awarded grants to Greenways Countryside Project, Martlesham Conservation Group, Martlesham In Bloom and The Saplings. The grant application process starts again in the autumn - details will be in the newsletters and on the Parish Council website from the start of September so look out for that if you have a project in mind for 2022/23.

Community Partnership.

The Community Partnership, who now have a further £25k available, is continuing with the environmental care and mental health themes. At the recent workshop in February of Town and Parish Councils in the Kesgrave. Martlesham. Rushmere St Andrew, Carlford and Fynn Valley wards which was well attended, the workshop was invited to explore three elements of the topic 'Environmental Care'. The Three questions were;

- 1. What are the current issues regarding the environmental care in our area?
- 2. What are the strengths regarding environmental care in our area?
- 3. What are the potential solutions/ projects to address the identified

The responses were many constructive. The officers and I who have analysed the suggestions considering these at our next Community Partnership meeting on Thursday 11th March 2021. The CP will subsequently consider the allocation of funds to make things happen.

Brightwell Lakes.

The area south of BT and east of the A12 known as Brightwell Lakes was in the ownership of a London based company; 'Carlyle Land'. On Wednesday 3rd March 2021 we suddenly learned that the land had been purchase by Taylor Wimpey from Carlyle Land. Taylor Wimpey are keen to get started on the project much to the relief of the District Council who had become concerned at the delays create by Carlyle

The new owner has indicated that they are happy to follow the current plans for the site although there may be some requests to amend the conditions agreed with the previous owner. I was pleased to see in the latest reminder by SCC for response to the A12 consultation which ends on the19th March 2021 that the proposed 'T' junction has now been included on the consultation map. I repeatedly drew every one's attention to the omission in the original consultation.

We are almost ready to place an order for new play equipment for the play area next to Martlesham Heath Pavilion. The design is quite different to the pictures in the Pavilion windows, however! When we get some new images, we'll put them up.

We decided to go with steel framed equipment, because we think it will last longer. There will be two play tower units, one for junior aged children and older and the other for early years – junior. Both will have slides. We are buying a double bay swing unit with four swing seats – a flat seat, a cradle seat for little ones, a Tango seat for adult and child to swing together and a seat based on the design for a Mirage jet for older children who need full body support. AGM Due to ongoing Covid restrictions we are still unable to commit as to where this year's AGM will be held. Gorse Management Works continue around the village but the gorse management programme which was to have started last month next to The Oaks has been delayed until later in the year due to a lot of activity from birds due to the mild weather. We would like to convey thanks to the SSSI team and volunteers who have just completed a cycle of burning gorse and other unwanted vegetation on the Western Corridor which is in line with the Environmental Stewardship Agreement.

New Bollards on Manor Road Green The new bollards have been installed at the Green on Manor Road and includes a drop down post for necessary access to the houses at this location.

Benches on Martlesham Heath MHHL receives several requests a year for both memorial and donated benches, these requests nearly always are for a position on the main Green. Although the Green may be considered a large area there are currently five benches of this type and several other seating areas that can be used on all sides. (There are also two benches in the play area behind the Pavilion which falls under that committee). This is thought sufficient for its size and we are also mindful of placing a bench in the wrong area which could cause noise to nearby residents. Unfortunately, due to this demand we are simply unable to allow any further benches on the main Green.

Over the years various MHHL committees have discussed this point and it was also agreed some time ago that no more benches are required on the main Green. The volunteer directors and volunteers have spent considerable time discussing the pros and cons of further seating areas and have walked the village to try to identify other suitable areas.

Two such areas have been identified and are to be used for donated benches, one is from East Suffolk Council Partnership which

stems from the premise of a Talking Bench to encourage people to begin new conversations with other people without the discomfort that talking to a stranger may have. They have been very successful in cities around the world and we support this initiative. Small changes like these can have a significant impact on local residents. This will be situated on the northern Green away from houses and in close proximity to the footpath that runs between Carlford Close and Manor Road. The other is from Woodbridge Rotary Club which will be positioned near to the windsock off Eagle Way.

MHHL currently maintains three other benches in the village which are located near to the Control Tower, the only other bench opposite Coopers Road on Eagle Way belongs to the Parish Council but is on our land. We do have a few memorial trees and do replace dead or diseased trees so this could be a consideration for the future at locations around the village.

Martlesham Conservation Group

Our heath (SSSI) on the western side of the village is an example of dry lowland heath(the rarest type of habitat in Europe), which should ideally be dominated by heathers with a mix of other low growing plants including fine grasses. Over this last winter a considerable amount of work has taken place on the heath to restore several areas to more favourable conditions. This work will allow the heath to provide a better habitat for the many animal and plant species characteristic of lowland heath. The heavier work involving mechanised equipment was undertaken by contractors through the Greenways project with more sensitive areas being cleared selectively by hand. The major work on scrub clearance on the SSSI was organised to avoid disturbing nesting birds and other wildlife such as reptiles as much as possible given the constraints of time and weather. I would like to also thank the volunteers from our Group who worked hard over a couple of days to dispose of the cut material in a bonfire. We apologise for any inconvenience caused at the time.

Members of the public, especially dog walkers can make a valuable contribution to the recovery of our heathland and its associated wildlife by sticking to the main paths. It may be tempting to wander freely across the open areas, particularly the ones that have been recently cleared, however these are just the areas that could be colonised by ground nesting birds and reptiles especially if the disturbance level could be kept low. So if you walk across the heath

please stick to the main paths, and if you are a dog walker we strongly advise you to walk your dog on a lead and stick to the main paths. This is partly for the benefit of our local wildlife but also for the protection of your dog as we seem to have a good population of adders present on the heath based on the numbers seen last year. Please don't be tempted to take short cuts across the open areas, especially the newly created ones and please remember all our British snakes and lizards are protected by law. If you want to know more about reptiles (and amphibians) try the website https://www.arc-trust.org.

The group will be filling in some holes along the main pathways on the heath. Please can dog owners deter their dogs from re-digging or making new holes so as to avoid creating further trip hazards for all members of the public.

In April, we should see the major influx of migrant birds with more varied song such as the Nightingale, Whitethroat, Garden Warbler and Lesser Whitethroat. Please listen out for these birds on our heaths and woodlands this year, and enjoy the rich soundscape of their birdsong.

Our work parties and surveys may return more regularly depending on the restrictions imposed by the ongoing Covid pandemic. Please contact me if you are interested in taking part in any of our work parties or wildlife surveys.



JUBILEE PLAYSPACE CONSULTATION

Would you like to see improvements to the Jubilee Playspace? Let us know by taking our survey!

What are we asking?

Martlesham Parish Council is carrying out a Parish survey until 23rd April, to gather feedback on two project options for improvements to our Jubilee Playspace, the area behind Carol Avenue, off Black Tiles Lane, Martlesham.

Why are we asking?

The 'Money To Play With' consultations in February 2016 and February 2018 both sought views on how to spend available 'sports and active play' funds in the Parish.

The 2016 and 2018 consultations settled on three projects for the Parish Council to take forward and deliver. The three projects were:

- a Trim Trail
- a Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA)
- a Pump Track at the Diamond Jubilee Bike Trails.

The 5km Trim Trail has been delivered so we are moving on to the next two project proposals checking that the 2016 and 2018 feedback still stands.

The majority of the funds comes from development monies for the Mill Heath housing and therefore it is a requirement that the money is spent on sport and active play in the vicinity of Mill Heath, Martlesham.

Why here?

Jubilee Playspace has been selected as the appropriate site for many reasons, including its usable space, ease of maintenance, environmental considerations, location, and other projects going on in the Parish. The proposals in the survey accommodate the existing tree canopies without removing any trees on site.

Unfortunately, the usable space is insufficient for a full size and 'all sports' Multi-Use Games Area so we have come up with a next best alternative:

In Option 1, for active play, remove the blue and possibly the red climbing frames to make space for a new circular, nest swing. Install a new steel multi-climber, similar to the illustration. Keep the existing swings and toddler tower. For active sport, install a new all-weather sports surface (19m x 8m). It comes with 2 stand-alone football goals and 2 cantilever basketball posts and hoops.

• In Option 2, install a new and enclosed sports surface with an all-weather, black, wet pour surface (22m x 13m). It comes with heavy duty football goal ends, rebound walls, 2 basketball hoops and green surround panelling. For safety purposes, there will also be 2 chicane openings for safe entry and exit to the court.

What's the difference between the 2 Options?

Option 1 offers new play equipment in the playspace <u>and</u> an all-season sports surface on the current kickabout football green, with no fencing around it. Option 2 combines the play and sports elements into one enclosed, multi-use, all -season sports and play surface.

We anticipate that for both Option 1 and Option 2, all the facilities will be used informally with users just turning up and playing (i.e. no booking required).

Neither option is intended to provide a competitive sports facility.

What about the bike trail project?

Once this second project is underway, we hope to further improve the bike trails. We would like more bike users and volunteers to get involved with managing the bike track so if you would like to have more say, please do contact us.

When will this happen?

If we get positive support for our proposals, we anticipate delivering your chosen option next year.

What next?

So, the choices are either Option 1 or Option 2. As ever, and we hope this is not the case, you might opt for 'Neither of the above' but that would mean we are back to the starting blocks and may have to return the money if it cannot be spent in time.



(How encouraging tree nurseries and home composting could help our Martlesham community to fight climate change)

Tree Nurseries

Trees deliver multiple benefits relevant to adapting to climate change. Frances Jannaway, co-ordinator of the Suffolk Tree Warden Network, continues to share great ideas with Suffolk tree wardens. Her latest idea is to encourage 'tree nurseries'. 'The response from tree wardens has been amazing' states Frances in the February edition of the Tree Council newsletter. To date, 16 Suffolk tree wardens have set up tree nurseries across their communities, ranging from small gardens to medium-sized nurseries at secondary schools. People other than tree wardens are also involved, from the Bishop of St Edmundsbury and Ipswich to an open prison in East Suffolk. Various materials and propagating methods are being tried out such as deep modular trays (cell grown), large pots, raised beds and moveable raised beds made from recycled materials. Some funding for deep modular trays, deep pots and tree growing books has been provided by Suffolk County Council.

Seeds are collected locally, mainly from native shrubs and trees, especially ancient pollards to maintain local genetic diversity. So far, more than 14,000 have been sown. Tree wardens are also taking cuttings from native black poplar and willow and collecting self sown saplings. There are future plans to involve more tree wardens as well as junior schools and community centres. The idea is that each year, more seeds from more species will be collected and sown to provide an ongoing supply. The first trees and shrubs will be available for planting in communities by winter 2022/23 and others will be offered to the proposed Suffolk County Council 'healing woods' initiative which is intended to enable people who have lost loved ones to Covid-19 to benefit from a space to grieve or reflect on the pandemic.

Even a small space can be used to grow young saplings so; if your school or organisation would be interested in growing seeds, or if you are interested in helping to set up a small tree nursery to grow saplings as a family or individual next autumn, please contact Martlesham Climate Action at:

Home Composting

Essentially, if a community can deal with all its own garden and food waste, this leads to less reliance on the bin collection service and retention of all organic garden matter in local soils. Composting is an inexpensive natural process that transforms your kitchen and garden waste into valuable and nutrient rich food for your garden

The Suffolk Waste Partnership have launched a scheme which gives Suffolk residents the chance to buy 220 Litre home composting bins for under £10 each. Through this scheme, you can buy a range of subsidised items which can help you to compost both your garden and kitchen waste at home if you do not already do so. To find all the offers on compost bins visit:

There is also a useful step by step guide on this website about how to compost at home including a useful 'recipe' for making good compost.

East Suffolk Council have their own Master Composter who has advised that the council provide a subsidy for hotbins which cost £129.99 for a hotbin mini or £179.99 for a larger version. A hotbin is a large thermal bin which can be used for all garden waste, raw food waste and shredded paper. Hotbins are capable of producing good quality compost in a much shorter space of time than ordinary compost bins. For information about subsidised hotbins, contact:

A Village of Vision? (5 of 6)

Gillian Darley (AJ Information Library, September 1979)

The physical fabric of the village, its various hamlets, its similarly 'traditional' pub and shopping centre are largely unremarkable. In the vein of Bowthorpe, South Woodham Ferrers and the better 'design guide' developments it offers little new. The plan is predictable, the landscaping minimal, thesetting drab.

Returning to the basic assumptions of Parker and the guidelines provided for his design team, the aspirations seem to consist of raising the common denominator-just as the better design guides intend and sometimes succeed in doing. It is, at the end of the 1970s, less easy to be excited by this ultimately reasonable standard of taste and, in any case, palates are getting jaded. A question which remains rhetorical is whether Parker's ideals in design and in spatial organisation within the village would have remained constant independent of the market. Design guide schemes have proved very saleable-all over East Anglia one can see proof of that fact. Martlesham Heath, its promoters making no secret of their dependence upon the whims of the market for changes of direction and prevailing choice of housing type is, by now, planned more by these factors than according to the wider aspects that a wish for a proper social balance might have dictated.

What then is the evidence of a village?

Martlesham Consultants, the management company which transfers shares from Bradford Property Trust to the residents as each house is completed, is nominally the governing body of the village-yet it remains for the moment dominated by the developers. Once it becomes 50 per cent (and more) representative of the residents a turning point will have been reached. The maintenance of the communal open spaces, in particular the green, lies with this body. It has the responsibility of employing two handymen/gardeners and the system, increasingly common in such private developments, prevents the depressing spectacle of uncared-for public areas which are so much the rule in badly managed public housing estates. Individual financial contributions are minimal and the onus is spread.

In fact, the increasing involvement of the people of the village (as opposed to the developers) with the care and development of their surroundings seems part of a growing-up process; the kind of mechanism for casting off authority that the founders of the paternalistic villages such as Saltaire and Port Sunlight (two of Bradford Property Trust's own present concerns) were never able, or willing, to build into their creations. The village has a Neighbourhood Association, just a year old, formed to provide an effective voice for residents' concerns. There is also an active Social Club, a Mother and Toddler group, seven residents stood in the recent parish council elections, a pub is under construction for Tolly Cobbold, a small pavilion to serve as a social centre is

also under construction, with some of the work being carried out by Heath residents themselves and cricket is being played on the green. Does all or any of this add up to proof of a self-contained community, with a sense of identity?

Perhaps the recent dissents over one issue illustrate that most clearly. The village was split on its attitude to existing parish boundaries and 60 per cent of those who voted wanted a change, to emphasise the identity of the new Martlesham. The village, now nearing two hundred households, clearly does not, either physically or historically, see itself connected to the village on the main road. Buyers of the housing (1975 prices between £9,000 and £30,000: 1979 middle range housing in the area of £25,000) have paid over the odds for the amenities, the careful design supervision and the other claims made for the development. They have, it might be said, 'bought' the concept of a new village. Sales literature, sign boards and the publicity all suggest that this is somewhere special. In the words of one resident 'everyone is bending over backwards to create the village environment'; yet essentially the residents, mostly from towns and with the scantest idea of what traditional village life really adds up to, are busy trying to make a recognisable place. As Alan Willis of the Neighbourhood Association points out, it is not really a village if everyone refers to 'Martlesham Heath Village' - no one refers to 'Lavenham Village'. Playing games with words has little to do with the gelling of this particular community.



MARTLESHAM AND THE DAWN OF AIR WARFARE.

The Photographic Flight at Martlesham in 1919. Research into aerial photography had been ongoing here since 1917. The picture shows the presence of women in the team. A most unusual feature for the time. They were known as 'members!'



As is well known, Martlesham was the site of an important research and development airfield, opened in January 1917.

This was just nine years after an aeroplane first took to the air in Britain.

The army hierarchy were slow to grasp the importance of these flying machines. However, it was obvious that he who could look down on the enemy had an important advantage. This had been the role fulfilled by balloons. Indeed, during previous conflicts in the nineteenth century men had gone aloft in balloons for this purpose. This was a most hazardous undertaking as the balloons were so vulnerable, particularly

during the Great War, (1914-18), when aircraft could so easily shoot them out of the sky.

Consequently the first role adopted by the Royal Flying Corps was in the field of reconnaissance. Pilots would become airborne to assess the strength of the opposition and to direct the guns to the best targets.

At first there was no radio contact with the ground and it was necessary for the aircraft either throw handwritten signals from the air or to land in order to pass information to the army. Later, when radios were sufficiently advanced to be carried on aircraft morse code was employed and the vital information could be transmitted to a ground control. It was a one way system as messages could only be sent and not received by the pilot.

Aerial photography developed in parallel with Morse code. The new "Aeroplane Experimental Station" at Martlesham, as it was called, was at the forefront in the development of combat techniques.

Our web site, www.mhas.org.uk contains a potted history of the aviation history of the village. Including a recording of the first radar interception from the air by an Avro Anson from Martlesham in 1937. Martlesham Heath Aviation Society look forward to welcoming visitors to the Control Tower Museum once more as soon as restrictions allow.

Martlesham Community Hall - Our Roadmap

Now we know the government 'roadmap' to take us out of the COVID-19 pandemic restrictions, we can start to make our reopening plans. All plan dates are of course provisional, based on the government's own 'step' dates.

The government recently announced they're funding COVID-19 Community Test Centres until the end of June. Suffolk Country Council have asked us if they can continue to use the Hall as a Test Centre until then.

Therefore our plans - as agreed by the Management Committee - are:

From 17 May (Step 3 date) - we'll reopen the Richards Room to hires. It appears that most indoor sport and activity classes will be allowed from then and some 'life event' gatherings. Social distancing etc. will still be in place, which will mean a maximum of 15 people in the Richards Room.

From 1 July - we'll reopen both the Community Hall and Richards Room to normal hires.

We'll agree a temporary Richards Room schedule for our regular hirers who wish to (and are allowed to) return from 17 May. Regular hirers will be then able to return to their previous session(s) and location as we fully reopen both the Community Hall and Richards Room at the start of July.




