





Tree of the Month - Red Oak (Querus rubra)



This month's tree can be found on the corner of Warren Lane and Eagle Way and was kindly proposed by Martlesham Heath resident, David Foster.

Red oak is a deciduous, fast-growing, broadleaf tree, native to North America. The bark develops warts or ridges with age. Shallow cupped acorns take two seasons to mature. Leaves are similar to those of English and sessile oaks, but more pointed.

Look out for their bright red fiery colour in autumn.

You can find a reporting tool on the Suffolk County Council Website where such matters can be inspected by them to see if further action is required. If deemed an obstruction they will contact the owner. The reporting tool also allows anyone to report a host of matters such as potholes, streetlights, and defects on the highway.

Martlesham in Bloom

Now we are into August many plants are in full bloom; remember to give them some feed, especially the ones in containers, to keep them flowering. Some do well if you keep deadheading them otherwise, they could go to seed and stop flowering.

You could fill any gaps in your borders or containers with plants that will flower into the autumn to increase and extend the season for you and the pollinators.

Plus, why not set yourself the fun challenge to see how many different insects and invertebrates you spot in your garden or containers. There is such a wide variety. Pollinators will be visiting flowers giving you an idea of what they prefer.

You may notice which flowers they are on in other people's gardens near you or in open spaces. Maybe there is a plant you could consider adding for next year to help increase your wildlife species numbers!

Invertebrates are important in their own right for the part they play in the ecosystem which includes as food for each other and other wildlife! As mentioned before, if you can have a bowl, for example, with sloping sides or a way of climbing out of it that wildlife can come to drink at, it will be appreciated by all.

Why more people are turning to yoga in later life!

I've been sharing yoga with groups and individuals of all ages for over 40 years. I was lucky to discover yoga when I was in my teens and it has helped me to cope with the challenges life has thrown at me. I'm a qualified British Wheel of Yoga teacher and the more I teach, the more I realise that yoga is attracting people of all ages who want to learn more about the benefits it can bring. Over the past few months I have seen an increase in the number of those in their later years who are taking up yoga both in classes and in one to one yoga sessions. A regular yoga practice can help to maintain strength and mobility and support mental wellbeing too and this is what many of my clients tell me they are looking to find for themselves.

So what is the appeal of hatha yoga?

As we age, our bodies change. Sensitivity in the feet and hands can diminish, muscle strength reduces and things like eyesight and hearing also undergo changes. These are the things which help us to know where we are (proprioception) and to adjust quickly if things change, like finding a bump in the pavement or encountering a slippery surface. You might find it more difficult to lift heavy items and dexterity can become a problem too.

It's not all bad news though – we can do something about it!

Those of you who were aware of yoga many years ago may be associating practising yoga with bendy poses, footless tights, slippery lycra leggings or even ballet leotards (yes really – that's all there was at the time!). You won't catch me wearing those now and in the same way that yoga clothing has moved on (think joggers, bamboo leggings, sports gear ...) so has the practice of yoga itself.

Yoga teachers today recognise the need for a balanced practice and finding the ideal combination of strength and flexibility. Put these two things together and you have mobility – a much better way to think about the long term gains of practising yoga. Add in some great breathing and meditation techniques and your ability to manage anxiety and cope in daily life improves too.

So if you've heard that building muscle is good for you, regaining strength is something you want, easing joints and muscles back into action is one of your goals, then come and have a chat with me about what yoga can do for you! And if all those things are still functioning well for you then yoga can help you to keep it that way and support your mental wellbeing too. It can help your running, cycling, swimming and other activities too.

I'm based at the Woodbridge Complementary Health Centre in Sandy Lane, Martlesham on Monday and Wednesday afternoons/early evening and due to popular demand Thursday mornings as well. I'm online on Thursday afternoons/early evenings and lead daytime classes on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. UPDATE FROM MARTLESHAM WILDS

June has seen the flowers doing all the talking at Martlesham Wilds!

Just look at these pictures. It is incredible what happens when you just leave a piece of land, however large or small, and allow nature to recover for a few years – it keeps on giving, and is surprising us all. The diversity we are seeing is a great indication that the land was previously farmed in a wildlife sensitive manner.

So far, our vegetation survey volunteers have recorded 91 species.

They are working in survey plots of 10m square, with the maximum count of species in one plot, currently at 38 – this is high.

There are a mixture of grasses, including some which are common, some more unusual native weedy species, and some non-native. Some interesting species have also been noticed outside the formal survey areas, such as Small-flowered Catchfly and Annual Knawel. As a result the pollinators are having a feast!

We will continue to track the changes in the species present at Martlesham Wilds over the years to come.

Can you create wildlife corridors for pollinators in your garden, school or work-place by leaving a patch to grow wild?

The bees and butterflies will love it and we suspect you would too!



MARTLESHAM CONSERVATION GROUP

The heathland of Martlesham Heath is particularly able to support a range of butterflies as there is a great mix of vegetation including heather, gorse, grassland and trees with areas of short vegetation that suit many butterflies.

These butterfly species include a nationally rare species, the Silver Studded Blue butterfly that uses heather and some other plants as its caterpillar food plant. It is important for wildlife conservation to try to maintain a good extent of heather and grassland and avoid dominance of some species of plant such as Bracken.

Although a common plant of heathland, Bracken is poor for conservation purposes as unfortunately it only supports a narrow range of wildlife in part due its toxic nature but also because it has the ability to smother other underlying plants.

The dwarf shrub layer of heather and grassland that it may have replaced is much more beneficial in comparison, supporting a wide range of invertebrates and higher animals (birds, reptiles, and mammals such as rabbits). Consequently it is important to reduce the extent and coverage of bracken in order to promote more heather and grassland to the benefit of a wider range of wildlife.

Our work parties over this summer have focused on trying to control bracken in a areas that have underlying heather. Bracken does dominate in some areas of our heath although we have had some success in pushing it back in other areas due to a regime of cutting and spraying in previous years.

Over the spring and early summer several bird species typical of heathland were around. It has been good to see and hear such species as Woodlark, Stonechat, Linnet, Nightjar and Dartford Warbler.

In August we may see some Grayling butterflies, these are a typical butterfly of dry sandy heathland relying on sparsely growing fine grasses such as Sheep's Fescue and plenty of bare ground in open sunny positions. Several areas of the heath were scraped to help promote similar conditions. You may also see the second emergence of several other butterflies including the Common Blue and Brown Argus butterflies.

Our work party in August will take place on Sunday 3rd August at 10am. Please meet on the Martlesham Heath SSSI on the bank that runs east-west just along from the interpretive sign that sits between Heathfield and the Oaks. We welcome anyone who can come along and help even if only for an hour or two. Also please get in touch if you have any interesting wildlife observations. My grateful thanks to those volunteers who helped on our last work party and did a great job clearing bracken. Fortunately we managed to finish just in time to avoid some heavy downpours.

MARTLESHAM HEATH AVIATION SOCIETY

Friday 4th July was our monthly meeting when welcomed Graham Murchie, a Trustee of the Bawdsey Radar Trust, who gave us the talk "The Eyes of The Few" looking at the development of Radar in this area.

The more you read on this topic, the more you realise that without the Royal Observer Corps, and the Command and Control System - but particularly the fledgling RADAR system – we would have lost the Battle of Britain, particularly when considering that the Luftwaffe greatly overwhelmed the RAF in the Autumn of 1940.

Graham started with what the Air Ministry had suggested would be able detect enemy aircraft. One idea was to use sound locators - even building large concrete Sound Mirrors on the Kent marshes. This was quickly dismissed as being completely unfit for purpose. Then some bright person suggested using a Death Ray (he must have been watching the film "Things to come"). A prize was even offered for someone to kill a sheep from 100 yards using this idea. But an engineer who was in the fledgling RADAR Team calculated that such a Ray, if it was got to work, would need all the power in the National Electricity Grid....

A question – where does the acronym RADAR come from? Answer below this writeup...

Then the work really started in earnest, first as proof of principal. This used a converted Ambulance and flying an old bomber through the radio waves of a large BBC Transmitter in the Midlands, which did just work. Work started on Orfordness with some Boffins staying at The Crown and Castle in Orford. The team expanded and moved into Cuthbert Quilter's Bawdsey Manor. The first Radar Station in the world was developed, following the erection of tall Transmitting and Receiving aerials, once again looking for echoes from approaching aircraft. Development was rapid -by the Boffins (this term was created accidentally to describe electronic wizards, such as were at Bawdsey).

Soon the idea of putting Radar into aircraft was suggested. This work, way back in 1937, required an aircraft carrying the transmitter and receiving equipment, and another to act as a target. The first aircraft to prove the concept flew from Martlesham Heath.

Once again, the military research establishments at Orfordness, Bawdsey and Martlesham Heath were at the head of development of not just Radar, but also other technical innovations throughout the War.

RAF Bawdsey, because of the threat of invasion, moved first to Scotland then near to Swanage – and eventually to Malvern – where their work continued. Radar continued to be used at the RAF Bawdsey site as part of the UK RADAR system, and its Military role continued well into the Cold War period.

On the evening of Wednesday 13th August our members and friends will use car-sharing to visit the fascinating "Great War Huts" site at Hawstead, south of Bury St. Edmund. They will explore (following a talk on how the site came about) a rebuilt Great War, (Eastern Front) Allied Training Camp and a reconstructed Trench System. We have to arrive by 7:00 pm, the event starting at 7:30pm. The site is being opened especially for us that night!

MARTLESHAM CLIMATE ACTION

Home solar (PV) system: should you consider a battery too (real data from a resident with gas central heating)?

Solar panels generate power during daylight hours. Any surplus over house consumption is exported to the grid unless it can be stored for later use. National grid statistics show a demand peak between 4pm and 7pm, hence energy companies encourage load shifting away from this period. How does our battery help?

Annually, 34% of our house consumption is direct from solar generation. Solar via battery storage adds 46%, so 80% is from owngenerated energy. In winter, when solar generation is much reduced, the battery can be charged overnight for use next day using a cheap-rate tariff, such as Economy 7. Including this grid top-up, the system provides 94% of house energy, including for cooking as we converted to electric appliances (but not heating; see below).


In summer, our solar system generates power from around 6am until around 8pm. It produces enough power to run the house (including hot water via a solar diverter to the hot water tank), Phil Bull with a surplus that is first used to charge the battery and then exported to the grid. After sunset, the battery powers the house until solar Martlesham Repair and Climate Advice generation resumes the next day. From April to September, solar powers the house directly or via the battery with minimal grid consumption.

In winter, solar generation starts later and ends earlier, from around 9:30 am to 3pm in December. On some days there is surplus power to charge the battery, but on other days very little is generated. In December, solar generation provides about 13% of house energy directly and another 13% via the battery. However, with overnight cheap-rate battery charging reducing peak-rate grid use, 83% of house consumption is supplied by solar and battery.

What size battery? In summer, our battery (13kWh capacity) contributes around 3kWh daily to power the house from stored solar after

sunset and overnight. In winter, because of reduced daylight hours, the battery contributes an average of 6.5kWh, some of which is from cheap-rate overnight

Generation (SEG) tariff.



rate electricity). Note that the daily standing charge has increased significantly in recent years to around £175 p.a. (depending on supplier and tariff). This can be offset by credit from exporting surplus solar to the grid using a Smart Energy

water from a battery filled up by cheap night

The relative energy cost savings from a solaronly vs solar+battery system will depend on the size of the installation and the import and export tariffs chosen. The extra cost of the battery is a consideration, but if your goal is to minimise grid consumption, then a battery is essential even though the payback time is longer than PV panels on their own.

Thought for the month.

"I've given up watching the news", said a friend to me recently. I know how she feels. Atrocity after atrocity, whilst cruelty, selfishness and apathy in the face of human suffering seem commonplace. How are we to respond to the events we hear about in the news, let alone the injustice and betrayals that sometimes affect us personally? Some respond with "an eye for an eye" sentiment, quite understandably. There is a place for anger when we hear about peoples' inhumanity. And yet Jesus's answer was different. His answer was forgiveness, something that he not only preached but practised when he forgave those who crucified him.

I think this is perhaps one of the hardest of Christian teachings. It appears to make no sense to respond to appalling evils with an offer of forgiveness. But perhaps we don't understand what Christian forgiveness actually is. Jesus isn't suggesting that bad things don't matter, nor a simplistic idea of moving on. Instead, it's a willingness to let go of our sense of being owed a debt, by leaving those that cause harm in the hands of our Heavenly Father. It might seem as though forgiveness means we are giving up our rights and self-respect, but in practice we discover new freedom and empowerment.

Sometimes the journey to being able to forgive is a long one, but each journey begins with the next step. That might be saying, "I'd like to be able to forgive but I'm not there yet". My prayer for us all is that we are able to join with Jesus in the prayer he himself taught us and say wholeheartedly "forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us."
